### Emoji Slang – What Parents Need to Know

Young people often use emojis in ways that go beyond their traditional meanings, sometimes to communicate things that parents may not immediately recognise. Some emojis may indicate risky behaviour, emotions, or even secretive 💸 conversations.

#### Here are a few emojis to be aware of:

- (Plug) Can reference drugs or illegal activities. (Leaf) Sometimes used to represent cannabis.
- (Pill) May indicate drug use. (Fire) Can signify something exciting, but also dangerouş or risky behaviour.
- 🗭 (Rocket) Sometimes used to reference speed or taking drugs,
- (Smirking/Devil Face) Can imply risky or rebellious behaviour.

#### How to Stay Informed:

- Talk regularly with your child about their online conversations and social media use.
- Use online resources to decode unfamiliar slang and symbols.
- Encourage honesty and let them know they can talk to you if they feel pressured or uncomfortable.

#### Here are some key safety tips:

- Set online boundaries Ensure your child understands what's appropriaté to share and who they can talk to.
- Monitor social media activity Encourage privacy settings and be aware of who they interact with
- Outdoor safety If your child is going out, ensure they have a charged phone and know emergency contacts.
- Avoid risky trends Talk to your child about avoiding dangerous social media challenges.
